Moving On: A program for at-risk women

Moving on is an intervention program specifically for at risk women who are involved or are at high risk of being involved with the criminal justice system. The goal of the program is to assist women in mobilizing and developing personal and social resources to reduce the risk of future criminal behavior.

Moving on not only focuses on reducing criminal behavior but also increasing the health and wellbeing of women, their families, and the community.

Moving On is a 26-week program that is made up of six modules; Orientation, Motivation to Change, Listening & Being Heard, Building Healthy Relationships, Expressing Emotions, Making

Connections & Staying Healthy, Ending: Graduation and Program Debriefing. The group meets once a week on Tuesday evenings from 6 to 8 p.m. in Mahnomen.

On Nov. 12, a graduation was held for the first session of Moving On. Three wonderful women completed the program and had a great time doing taking part! They felt the program helped them change their mindset, enabled them to make better choices and gave them goals for the future.

Boozhoo Gaa-waabaabiganikaag Aaniin Niminwendam Waabaminaan!

Manidoo-Giizisoons!

Gii-wiisiniiminaanan gikinoo'amaagewinan manidoo-waadiziiwinan gaa-minwendamaang ezhiaandizooke.

Aaniish inaa akawe ninga-gaagiizomaag aadizookaanag.

Greetings White Earth Nation I am Happy to See You!

It is already December- Little Moon!

We feasted the spirits- it is the beginning of storytelling season. Mother Earth is blanketed by goon,

Everyone Be Safe.

In the deep quiet of Manidoo Giizisoons, December, when the snow settles like a blanket across the old paths, our elders say when Mama Aki Mother Earth gets blanketed by goon-snow and everything slows down we have a feast for the Adizookaan so we can ask permission to begin telling Nanaboozhoo and Creation stories.

"Biboon ogii-ani-naanaagadawendam" "Winter teaches us to reflect."

Long ago, there was a teenager named Waaseya, whose heart felt heavy from the mistakes and hardships of the passing year. As the Manidoo-Giizisoons our final moon of the year and biboon, winter approached, Waaseya walked into the forest, searching for a way to let go of everything that had built up and to seek guidance for a healthier year to come.

The forest was silent except for the soft groan of the trees. Waaseya sat beneath a tall pine with closed eyes. After a long stillness, a gentle voice in the

"Do not carry yesterday's burdens into today."

Waaseya looked around, but there was no one there only the old Zhingwaak Pine tree standing boldly above. Its branches shook softly, releasing small showers of goon, snow. In that moment, Waaseya understood the Zhingwaak was giving a teaching.

Just as the Zhingwaak the pine sheds its old needles to make room for new growth, so too must we release what no longer serves us.

"Maajitaa gidaa-izhichigeyan" — "Begin your new actions."

Waaseya took a deep breath and spoke aloud the things they wished to let go—fear, anger, regret, pain of bullies and the sorrow which accumulated. With each word, the cold air carried the weight away. When Waaseya finally stood up and hollered the last of it loudly OUT with a heart feeling free now, as though biboon winter noodin, wind had nabbed it and swept it away clean.

As Waaseya walked home beneath the moonlight, Waaseya heard one last whisper from the for-

"Omaa giga-zaaga'igoyaan" — "Here, you are loved."

Waaseya shed a happy tear leaving back to the village. When arriving Waaseya shared what had happened and learned - that ManidooGiizisoons December is not just an ending, but a sacred pause. It is the moment between breaths when we choose what we will carry forward, and what we will leave

And so for the coming year, we remember:



"Gii-izhaadaa mino-bimaadiziwin 2026" "Let us walk toward a good life in 2026."

The story teaches us that renewal is not a single moment, but a choice made again and again. Just like Zhingwaak giikinoo'amaage the teaching pine tree, always releasing what holds it back, always growing, always reaching for the light pushing forward.

Here's an update from our White Earth Nation's Workforce/Human Resource Divisions.

For the past six months, the White Earth Reservation Human Resource Department directors and assistant directors have met monthly to collaborate, strategize, share resources, and to engage new ideas to enhance the overall employment experience.

This monthly collaboration and goal setting ensures that we are maintaining fairness and consistency, streamlining policy and procedures, enhancing employee benefits, and increase efficiencies in our internal processes.

One goal was to analyze the employment data set from each entity separately and collectively. The demographic data allows us to see where we can increase employee satisfaction, increase growth and training opportunities and remain competitive with wages in northern and greater Minnesota.

The data is being shared so our people can see that we focus on Native Preference in hiring. It also shows our age demographics and our years of service. Keep in mind that the WERBC has been open for over 50 years, while other entities have opened at different times with Waabigwan within the past few years.

We are proud that our employees are the ones who truly make the difference. From each individual employee's contribution, the White Earth Nation continues to be successful and progressive. We strive to promote and focus on sustainability efforts that our 7 generations will benefit from. This level of commitment ensures the best possible service and care is delivered and provided for all people our White Earth Nation serves.

Our overall workforce can be summarized as follows:

Total Employees: 2,145

Enrolled Members: 977 (45.55%) Descendants: 264 (12.31%)

MCT (Minnesota Chippewa Tribe): 71 (3.31%) Other Native American Tribes: 167 (7.79%)

Non-Native: 666 (31.05%)

The largest employers are the White Earth Reservation Business Committee (WERBC): 1,213

As the year ends, I'm sharing key updates that benefit Tribal members both on and off the reservation. This December update also covers major 2025 achievements that show our commitment to transparency, financial stability, and community wellbeing.

Confidential Financial Data Request Procedure

In November, the Tribal Council passed a new Financial Data Request Procedure that allows White Earth Tribal members to request confidential financial information in a secure and respectful manner.

For years, many members have asked for greater insight into our financial standing. I believe in transparency, accountability, and empowering our members with information. This new process ensures that members can access sensitive information while still protecting financial materials and private business information.

Holiday Support for Every Adult Tribal Member: \$300 Disbursement Approved

I am excited to announce that during the November Tribal Council meeting, I placed a \$300 Holiday Disbursement for all adult White Earth Tribal members on the agenda — and it passed unanimously.

Our Tribe is in a solid financial position. Because of strong oversight across all divisions, departments, and enterprises, we can provide direct support to our people when it matters most. I supported this disbursement because the holiday season creates financial pressure for families due to travel, food, gifts, and related obligations.

Official instructions for the application process are being published on the White Earth website and Facebook page.

Elder Financial Support

Supporting Elders remains one of my highest priorities.

In 2025, Elders will receive the following financial supports when requested:

- \$100 Holiday Gift (yearly)
- \$50 Casino Credit (monthly)
- \$25 Food Coupon (monthly)

These benefits help ensure our elders can meet their basic needs, participate in community activities,



and maintain social connections.

Supporting Urban Tribal Members

This year, I supported transportation assistance for urban Tribal members to attend local events. I am committed to promoting accessible participation for our off-reservation membership.

Investing in Our Off-Reservation Communities

Supporting our urban and off-reservation Tribal members remains a key focus for me. This year, I advocated for transportation assistance to help urban Tribal members attend local events, ensuring accessible participation for those living off reservation.

Additionally, every year I contribute to each of the three off-reservation community councils, providing support for their cultural events, youth programming, and community gatherings. These efforts help strengthen relationships and keep our members connected to the Nation, regardless of where they reside.

White Earth Head Start Dual Language / Immersion Classroom

Boozhoo Indinawemaagonidog, Gizhiibayaash Indigoo, Migizi Nindoodem, Gaawaabaabiganikaag Nindoonjibaa Indaa.

I wanted to start by introducing myself in our language, my name is Bryce King-Hanks Sr., I am 35 winters old, and I am the father to a wonderful nine-year-old boy, Bryce King-Hanks Jr. I am from the White Earth Reservation. So, I've recently taken the position with the White Earth Head Start as the Dual Language Classroom Teacher. I have been asked to give a little background on myself and the newest classroom we have created here.

My mother and father are Kaye Marie Hanks and David Joseph King. I was born in southside Minneapolis, but I was raised here on the White Earth Reservation, I attended the Circle of Life school in White Earth until fourth grade, I spent the rest of my schooling at Waubun High School where I graduated in 2010.

Since I was 10 years old, I have been actively involved in the Ojibwe language and culture, I always referred to my adoptive father Michael Dahl and my grandmother Mary Jo King as key figures in my life that had helped me succeed and pushed me to be a better person.

Growing up I never knew what I wanted to do in life, in 2019 my auntie Susie Ballot asked me to try applying at the Circle of Life Academy in White Earth as a cultural teacher. From there my experience grew as an educator and I found my passion in life; I was teaching kids from my reservation what it meant to be Ojibwe and I loved it. I spent five years at COLA, and I loved every second of it. Now I am working to help revitalize our language starting with our little ones.

Amikwiish - A Beavers Lodge – referring to the place where little beavers begin learning together from their parents where they are protected from outside dangers.

A dual language immersion classroom is an educational setting where students are taught in two languages. This involves using one language for part of the day and the other language for the remaining part. The two languages of instruction will be in Ojibwe

and English. Ojibwemowin-focused time will involve no use of English except if there is a safety concern or special circumstance.

Children can benefit from learning Ojibwe by connecting them to the ancestral language of the Ojibwe people. Children who are part of a dual language classroom have been shown to enhance cognitive skills such as problem solving and critical thinking.

Learning skills and content through activities and application with Ojibwe language as the medium of instruction will provide hands-on contextual learning. This will engage learner interest and support their comprehension of the language and association of language with the skills and content they are learning. When learning in a first language, focus is explicitly based on the content.

Dual language immersion focuses on language acquisition with skill development as the medium for language learning. This form of tandem learning may give the illusion that the child is developing skills and content acquisition slower than first language peers, however their learning is comparative with single-language learning children overall, and they often academically surpass their peers by the end of the program.

Amikwiish is based at the White Earth Head Start building, we are currently looking for children ages three to five to enroll, please stop by and apply if interested. These are just some of the steps being taken for immersion on the White Earth Reservation for early childhood. It is my hope that this will continue to grow. Miigwech Bizindawiyeg

The classroom operates 9 a.m. to 3:15 p.m. Monday through Friday, based on the White Earth Head Start calendar from Sept. 2, 2025, through July 29, 2026. Transportation and/or Wrap around services are provided per White Earth Head Start policies and procedures.

On Rez enrolled Elders eligible for free garbage service

To qualify for free garbage service through the Tribal trash payment program there is an application process. Application forms should be filled out and returned to White Earth Sanitation along with a copy of your enrollment card. To qualify you must be at least 55 years old, an enrolled member of the White Earth Nation, and live within the reservation boundaries.

We will be servicing you on a weekly basis for most customers but due to certain routes, we might only be able to stop every other week. We will determine which route you will be assigned to when we set up your service. This varies based on physical address.

Your service is limited to up to three 30-gallon garbage cans or bags. These must be set out at the end of your driveway. The garbage men lift your cans manually so please do not use the 50-gallon drums with no handles. Also, we will only be able to service your primary residence for free through the tribal payment program. If you have more than one property you will have to pay for an extra service out of pocket. Dumpster services do not qualify through the tribal payment program. We will continue to bill individuals

separately for the dumpster service. Transfer station dumping is not free. This is only for curbside services on the routes.

Most holidays are worked so if your day falls on a holiday the routes will run. If there is a change in your day of service, we will notify the customers through the Mahnomen paper, on the radio, or through our Facebook page. If there are only a few people we need to contact, we will do it by letter or a note on your cans.

Due to inclement weather and road conditions during the winter months, some roads are not suitable for our trucks to come down. If this happens, we will not be able to pick up your trash until the following week or at the next scheduled stop. We do apologize for any inconvenience this may cause. We must have a special tow truck come out to handle the garbage truck if it gets stuck and it is very expensive.

News From District 2 Rep. Eugene Sommers

Boozhoo Anishinaabe.

This month Federal and State actions brought significant challenges that directly impact our services, our schools, and our sovereignty. From education policy to federal funding and consultation standards, White Earth continues to advocate, engage.

Federal Government Reopens

After 41 days of shutdown, Congress advanced a short-term Continuing Resolution to reopen the Federal Government and extend FY2025 funding levels through Jan. 30, 2026.

- For Tribal Nations this means stability for essential programs.
- Child nutrition programs continue without interruption, ensuring our schools and students receive needed support.
- Mandatory programs remain fully funded, including SNAP, WIC, Tribal TANF, and childcare services.
- Tribes will receive reimbursement for any costs incurred during the shutdown, including backpay for staff who were affected.
- Critical services regain stability, including BIE schools, Tribal colleges, health programs, and youthfocused initiatives such as Head Start and childcare. **Minnesota Department of Education Consultation**

The RBC met with MDE to strengthen statewide support for Native students in K-12 and early childhood education. Topics included cultural curriculum, data accuracy, and Native student outcomes across Minnesota.

Federal Education Actions

Recent Congressional hearings focused heavily on the future of education and access for Native and rural students:

- "From Classroom to Career" Hearing (Nov. 19): Discussions centered on expanding Career & Technical Education (CTE) pathways—important for our youth entering trades, carpentry, and workforce development programs.
- "Future of College" Hearing (Nov. 18): Lawmakers examined affordability, innovation, and technology in higher education. These conversations will influence access for Native and first-generation
- Head Start: Pacific jurisdiction grants were stabilized. Although not specific to Tribes, it signals continued federal commitment to early childhood learning programs nationwide.

Legislation Affecting Tribal Education:

- H.R. 5328 Indian Programs Advance Appropriations Act. Would secure year-ahead funding for the Bureau of Indian Education to prevent future shutdown disruptions.
- H.R. 4085 Haskell Indian Nations University Improvement Act. Proposes establishing Haskell as a federally chartered institution—reinforcing treatybased trust responsibilities for Tribal higher educa-


Supporting America's Children and Families Act

Federal agencies are conducting consultations on updates to Title IV-B, which directly affect:

- ICWA implementation
- Tribal child welfare agencies
- Court Improvement Programs
- Remote hearing systems
- Prevention efforts and family support services White Earth Nation is monitoring these sessions.

OMB Deregulatory Guidance

The Office of Management and Budget released new deregulatory guidance that weakens Tribal consultation requirements, allowing federal agencies



more flexibility to bypass Tribal input.

This change poses risks across:

- Education
- Land and environmental regulation
- Economic development
- Tribal sovereignty and decision-making authority

HOWAH Cultural and Wellness Challenge

White Earth RBC employees recently participated in the annual HOWAH Cultural and Wellness Challenge, a wellness-focused event promoting healthy habits and cultural connection. Employees who weighed in and either maintained their weight, lost weight, or were within a healthy BMI range received a \$100 incentive. The event also included community vendors, wellness resources, and healthy activities that supported overall well-being.

Gaming Commission Meeting

On Nov. 20, the White Earth Gaming Commission convened to review regulatory, compliance, and operational updates. These discussions help ensure the continued integrity, transparency, and accountability of our Tribal gaming enterprises.

11-13 We attended the Detroit Lakes Public School Powwow, it was great to see so many schools and students, teachers, parents gathered together. During the first intertribal the young people made their way down the stairs to join the circle. From a distance, they looked like a long line of determined little ants, all eager to dance. It made my heart happy and smile. We all felt the absence of Mike Swan but we understand and support his need to rest and take care of himself. We must listen to our bodies when it is time to slow down. We look forward to seeing him return when he's ready. We hope everyone enjoyed themselves, met new friends and learned about our Anishinaabe culture that continues to grow in our communities.

The Tribe hosted a supper for the Mahnomen/Waubum Thunderbird football team before they traveled to U.S. Bank Stadium in Minneapolis. We joined the players and coaches as they shared a meal and laughter, preparing themselves for the challenge ahead. I want to acknowledge the time, the dedication and the work the Thunderbird football team all put in this season. Congratulations on your incredible season, be proud of your accomplishments!

11-25 Tribal leaders and staff joined consultation with Minnesota Department of Health Commissioner Dr. Brooke Cunningham and her team. The meeting focused on several key topics including data modernization efforts and the importance of data sovereignty to ensure tribal control over their information. The discussion also covered the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) and ongoing legislative proposals that may impact tribal communities. This discussions highlight the collaborative efforts to improve data systems, uphold tribal sovereignty and advocate for policies that support the needs and rights of tribal nations.

11-26 The monthly regular RBC meeting was held at the Shooting Star Casino. During the meeting, leaders approved a one-time safety and health assistance benefit for all adult enrolled members of the White Earth Nation. The benefit provides financial assistance of \$300 to members aimed at supporting their safety and well-being during these challenging times. The application and process will be out soon.

Elder and Vulnerable Adult Program

We are dedicated to supporting our community's elders and vulnerable adults through our Elder and Vulnerable Adult Program. If you have concerns about an elder or vulnerable adult or if you know someone who may need assistance, please do not



hesitate to reach out. Our team is here to help ensure the safety and well-being of those who may need extra support.

Our elder advocates are available to assist with a variety of essential services including transportation to medical appointments, grocery shopping, bill payments, medication pickups and assistance with completing applications for various services. We can also help with submitting these applications to the appropriate agencies or organizations.

Lynn Tibbetts is our dedicated social worker specializing in placement and case management. She works to find suitable living arrangements for individuals who are no longer able to remain in their homes whether in nursing facilities or other appropriate placements. Lynn coordinates visits between families and their loved ones in care, manages guardianship payments and oversees all aspects of case management for guardianship cases.


Then there was Michael Neusser who put together a fantastic team from the RBC HOWAH challenge. They collected a lot of food and cash donations. Thank you to all who were involved.

WE Constitution Reform Delegate Report - December 2025

White Earth Constitution Reform Delegate

Boozhoo MCT/White Earth Members:

As a part of the MCT Constitution Reform Delegate Group, the White Earth delegates would like to update our constituents on one important issue we have been discussing and share this information on the following topic:

MCT Secretarial Election - Future Tribal Executive Committee (TEC) action may be conducted to amend Article XII-Amendment of MCT Revised Constitution. The Tribal Executive Committee (TEC) has proposed the Secretary of the Interior be removed from his/her role overseeing the constitutional amendment process in Article XII of the MCT Constitution, which most view as a paternalistic holdover from 1936. If this change is made, the TEC will eventually need to vote on a new oversight process that will replace the Secretary of the Interior's authority over MCT Constitutional amendments.

- ◆ The Secretarial Election is a federal election, and will be conducted entirely through mailout ballots.
- ◆ A Secretarial Election must be conducted within ninety (90) days of receipt of a request to amend an existing constitution.
- ◆ The MCT membership will have the opportunity to vote on this constitution amendment.

"MCT Revised Constitution Article XII – Amendment"

Section 1. This constitution may be revoked by Act of Congress or amended or revoked by a majority vote of the qualified voters of the Tribe voting at an election called for that purpose by the Secretary of the Interior if at least 30 percent of those entitled to vote shall vote. No amendment shall be effective until approved by the Secretary of the Interior. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to call an election when requested by two-thirds of the Tribal Executive Committee

Advantages of Removing the Secretarial Election Requirement:

- o MCT Tribal Self-governance and Self Determination.
- o Secretarial Election flexibility to be determined by our members and the ability to make change to our MCT Constitution by our timelines.

Disadvantages of Removing the Secretarial Election Requirement:

o Cost of Secretarial Elections (for subsequent constitutional amendments).

Additional information to share:

- MCT Constitution Reform Convention monthly meetings are hosted January-November by each MCT Reservation, they are scheduled for the 3rd Friday of each month.
- In December the TEC will be meeting, our members are welcome to attend. A meeting date and location have not been scheduled but this information will be shared once we are notified.
- White Earth will be hosting the MCT Constitution Reform Convention meeting on Friday, Jan. 16, 2026 at the Shooting Star Event Center from 9 a.m.-4 p.m., please attend if you are able.



His secret to success? Routine. "Staying busy in a productive way and staying on top of homework is everything," he explains. His definition of success: "Not giving up, even when life gives you reasons to. Resilience IS success."

Matty plans to continue his education at Bemidji State University, working toward a bachelor's in social work with a minor in addictions. "WETCC has been the backbone of my success," he says. "They helped me realize my strengths and build a foundation for serving my community."



Tips to help keep pets comfortable as possible throughout the cold months

Winter is fast approaching, and there are many outdoor pets and stray animals who will be facing frigid temperatures soon. Of course we hope that when snow flies they will have a warm spot in a house, garage or barn but sometimes that isn't in the cards. Here are some tips to help keep pets as comfortable as possible through the cold months.

Shelter

Solid walls, wind proof, raised off the ground if possible. Some pets are okay with a door flap and some aren't - door flaps are preferable to help keep heat in but you want to make sure your pet will use it. If they seem unsure, you can work with them by tossing high-value treats inside and praise gently when they go inside. Feeding them inside their shelter can be helpful as well once they feel brave to build a positive association. Please use bedding that is not blankets - blankets freeze. Straw stays dry and warm.

Water

Ice and snow might seem like they do the trick, but in reality it is not enough and lowers their body temperature. If you are curious, take a glass of snow and let it melt inside - a full glass of snow equals very little water. Heated water bowls are fairly cheap and can save lives. Check water twice a day to make sure there are no malfunctions in your heated bowl or to clear ice in a regular bowl

or small bucket.

Food


Cold temperatures burn calories very quickly. Bump up food portions so pets can keep their body heat stable. Aim for higher protein formulas for active dogs if possible. Don't be afraid to supplement their diet with pet-safe meal add-ons, such as peanut butter (check ingredients for xylitol or birch sugar - if these are listed, do not use as they are toxic), eggs, cooked plain oatmeal, lean boneless unseasoned meats, plain canned pumpkin (not pumpkin pie filling), sweet potatoes, yogurt, cottage cheese or broth.

Paws

Snow, ice and salt can do damage to paw pads - if possible, use pet-safe ice melt and routinely check your pet's paw pads for cracks, scrapes or other abrasions. You can use products like Musher's Secret or Bag Balm on them to help keep their feet healthy.

Please remember that are tough as our Rez dogs and cats are, they are no match for our subzero temperatures - if you can, please bring them inside when the weather becomes harsh. We hope these tips help - if you have any questions please feel free to reach out to us!

Cold weather tips from Water and Sewer

- The most likely spot for water lines to freeze is where it enters the house/building. Make sure warmer air can reach pipes where water enters the house/building. If you have heat tape wrapped around your pipes make sure it is plugged in.
- Check around your home for areas where water supply lines are in unheated areas and take measures to prevent the flow of cold air in these areas. Common locations include: basement, crawl space, attic, garage, and under kitchen and bathroom cabinets
- Determine where your water shut-off valve is in your house and learn how to use it. For most homes the shut-off valve is located near the water meter at the point where the water line comes into your home, which usually in your basement. If a pipe freezes and breaks it will be important to know where the shut-off valve is located.
- Keep the thermostat set to the same temperature both during the day and at night. By temporarily suspending the use of lower nighttime temperatures,

you may incur a higher heating bill, but you can prevent a much more costly repair job if pipes freeze and burst.

- Do not plow or drive over the area where your water and sewer lines are buried. Doing so pushes the frost further into the ground, increasing the risk of freeze up.
- Make sure the roof vent is not covered with snow or blocked. Snow build up over the vent will cause the sewer drain to slow down. This prevents the warmer air in the sewer system from venting up the house and keeping the line above from freezing.
- Make sure any sewer cleanouts or risers (white pipes in the yard) are capped so none of the cold air can enter the sewer system causing a freeze up.

Please contact the White Earth Water and Sewer department in the event of your water or sewer freezing at 218-983-3202. The community water systems will monitor water temperature to prevent community freeze ups.



Peter "Pete" James Martin Jr.

Peter "Pete" James Martin Jr., 88, passed away unexpectedly on Oct. 29 in Lakewood, Colo. Born on July 21, 1937, in White Earth, Pete lived a full, independent, self-directed life rooted in service, family, with a deep connection to his heritage and native people. Peter is a proud citizen of the White Earth Ojibwe Nation, Pembina Band.



The close-knit community of White Earth shaped Pete's early years. He began his education at White Earth Elementary and graduated from Wahpeton High School, N.D. His pursuit of knowledge led him to the North Dakota School of Science Wahpeton and later to New Mexico University, where he laid the foundation for a distinguished career in civil engineering, public service, the protection of tribal sovereignty, and tribal economic development.

When Pete lived in Wahpeton, he played baseball with a Wahpeton traveling baseball team when small, rural towns all had baseball teams that played against each other during the summer months. Pete honed his skills as a catcher and first baseman during this time and played baseball or softball throughout his 20s and 30s

in some capacity. Peter loved baseball!

As a civil engineer, Pete played a pivotal role in the establishment of Lake Oahe—an achievement that marked the beginning of a long and impactful career with the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA), under the U.S. Department of the Interior. His work took him across several key locations including Aberdeen, S.D.; Albuquerque Indian School; Santa Fe Indian School (now known as the Institute of American Indian Arts); Denver, Colo., as the Director of ITEC, a BIA branch dedicated to the economic and infrastructure development in Indian Country, then finally to the Muskogee Area Office where he retired. Pete returned to Denver in the late 1980s to live surrounded by his family.

Throughout his tenure with the BIA, Pete was deeply involved in initiatives that supported tribal sovereignty and tribal economic development. He contributed significantly to programs under the Indian Financing Act of 1970, which expanded revolving funds for tribal economic projects through ITEC Economic Development. His dedication to Indian Country was unwavering and left a notable legacy within Native communities.

Beyond his professional accomplishments, Pete was a devoted father, grandfather, and sibling who cherished time spent with his family. He is lovingly remembered by his children: Susan Johnson, Michael Martin (Kristi Peltier), and Dianne Demko; grandchildren: Michael Johnson (Kara), Nick Johnson (Julie), Jessie McKerley (Matt), Himalaya Johnson, Ben Demko, Michelle McPeek (Luke), Jacque Demko (Dan), and Shannon Peltier; great-grandchildren Margaret (Maggie) Johnson, Nick Johnson, Emmett McKerley, Mila McKerley, Ethan Loh, Christian Peltier; siblings: Jeanette Munson, Dick Martin (Dolores), Bonnie Walz, and Elaine Salinas (Al); many Martin and Youngbird nieces and nephews; and his beloved chihuahua companion, Lucky.

Peter is preceded in death by his parents James B. Martin and Dorothy Mae Rogers Martin; maternal grandmother Agnes Rogers; paternal grandparents; siblings Karen Brant and Gary Martin.

Pete's passions were as vibrant as his stories—he had an extraordinary memory and a gift for storytelling that brought laughter and history to life at every gathering. He found joy in golfing and fishing (especially when walleye with wild rice was on the menu), watching old movies and all kinds of sports—from little league baseball to major league football—with special loyalty to the Colorado Rockies and Denver Broncos. He loved country western music and had an enduring appreciation for trees—particularly pine and birch—and for spending time with those he held dear. Peter had an enthusiastic sense of humor, finding joy and humor in daily life. He enjoyed laughing and joking with friends, family, and casual acquaintances on topical events and situations.

His heart remained forever tied to White Earth Ojibwe Nation and Indian Country at large. He held deep affection for both the Youngbird and Martin families as well as every family dog that crossed his path.

A memorial service for Peter Martin will be held in Colorado in 2026.

May his memory bring comfort to those who knew him, and may his legacy continue through the lives he touched so deeply.

MN Wild make history with Ojibwe-language television broadcast in celebration of Native American Heritage Day

When the Wild's home in St. Paul officially went from Xcel Energy Center to Grand Casino Arena back in September, owner Craig Leipold spoke about how excited he was for this new partnership.

Melissa "Baabiitaw" Boyd knew how that bond could be reflected beyond the name on the outside of the building and at center ice.

"I couldn't help myself," said Boyd, who is on the board for the Midwest Indigenous Immersion Network and a member of the Mille Lacs Band of Ojibwe. "At the same time as [Leipold] was talking, I put my hand straight in the air."

She suggested Ojibwe-language commentary for the games, and that idea came to life Friday (Nov. 28) with the first-of-its-kind broadcast during the host Wild's 3-2 shootout victory over the Colorado Avalanche.

"We're thrilled," Boyd said.

In celebration of Native American Heritage Day, which former goaltender Marc-Andre Fleury previously commemorated with a custom mask, the Wild broadcast was streamed on the FanDuel Sports Network website and app and produced by the network in conjunction with Grand Casino, the Mille Lacs Band of Ojibwe and the Midwest Indigenous Immersion Network.

A Minnesota-based nonprofit, Midwest Indigenous Immersion Network works to strengthen and expand Anishinaabe language revitalization by bringing organizations together to advocate and advance language preservation, re-normalization and

Its focus is to create long-term, systemic change and learning across generations, and three generations were featured on the broadcast that had plenty to highlight in the Wild's seventh consecutive victory: Kirill Kaprizov scored twice to eclipse 200 goals, Matt Boldy delivered his eighth career shootout winner and the Wild defeated the first-place Avalanche to end their Central Division rival's 10-game win streak.

"Once in a lifetime," Boyd said, "but now it's going to be our new norm, right? We're going to demand that it happens with all other professional sports, and I'm sure that there are other nations in the country that would like to do that."







Chairman represents White Earth at MN Wild game


